SUPPORTING VULNERABLE **PEOPLE & COMMUNITIES**

Support for providing basic needs & securing employment In 2023 we offered programmes and services aimed at boosting income and supporting people who experience economic exclusion.

Recognizing that cross-sectoral cooperation (between field workers and decision-makers) may lead to new proposals and solutions for implementing actions and changes, we strengthened our partnerships with institutions and other organisations dedicated to defending people's rights and ensuring the equal inclusion of vulnerable populations.

Key groups we collaborate with include the social workers' and the job counsellors' networks, consisting of professionals from civil society organisations, local authorities, and other bodies, aiming to exchange information, implement best practices, and support each other on a daily basis.

SUPPORTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE & COMMUNITIES

Securing income and improving everyday life

Across all the countries where we work, our priority is to ensure people's survival by securing access to adequate food and good quality water; then, we focus on improving living conditions in their daily lives.


We train community members in more efficient, alternative, or entirely new methods of income generation through targeted programmes, empowering them with the tools they need to improve their lives. We also help disadvantaged families access the benefits they are entitled to and establish savings and credit cooperatives, providing members with the opportunity to secure loans for starting their own small businesses.

"If you only focused on supporting our children directly, we, their parents, would remain in poverty and ignorance. But you keep inviting us to participate in trainings. I am a farmer and I have attended a programme on making organic fertilizer and manure. The activities you introduce are always relevant to what we do here. Over the years, you've done so much for us. I can't imagine what our life would be like without you!"



"I used to rent a field near the river, about seven kilometres from my homestead, where I grew vegetables. I had no other choice, because I didn't have access to water at home. It was difficult to go there every day, so I would bring vegetables for three days at a time. Now I can farm a small area of land next to my house, and my production is quite good. This is a really great project."

In Bangladesh, we trained **120 women** in income generating activities, such as tailoring and mushroom cultivation.

Knowledge as a springboard for change

Education is a key driver for long-term societal change, helping people acquire knowledge, developing skills, and promoting values that shape active citizens committed to a better world.

Through the actions of our Education Department:

- Over 650 teachers were trained, provided with educational material and participated in ActionAid workshops
- 449 adults and children engaged in our educational programmes at our Community Centre in Athens.



114 children participated in non-formal education programmes such as football, visual arts, theatre and the summer camp.

94 children were enrolled in formal education programmes such as tutoring, English language, and computer courses.

188 children visited the Centre with their schools, an activity that resumed in 2023 after being paused during the pandemic.

For the 19th consecutive year, we organised the Student Action Week, focusing on sustainable nutrition, responsible consumption, good health, and the impact of food waste on the environment and climate. The action involved 100 schools (kindergartens, primary schools, secondary schools) from all over Greece, 145 teachers and 2,421 students.



At the Community Centre of Northern Evia:

- 984 children participated in educational activities in their schools and in our programmes, such as creative study initiatives, the Mobile Forest School and the summer camp.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMES

Access to quality education for all

Education is a critical tool for fighting the root causes of poverty and is essential for young people to shape a better future. In all the countries where we operate, a significant portion of our efforts focuses on improving education, whether through upgrading infrastructure and equipment or by advocating for the right to education for everyone.

Our aim is for all children to complete their schooling and have access to the resources and support they need.

To this end, in 2023 we continued our commitment to education and lifelong learning by:

- improving equipment and infrastructure
- providing school supplies
- granting scholarships to the most vulnerable students
- supporting teachers in their professional and personal lives
- organizing educational programmes, training courses, and awareness campaigns about the right to education

We also worked to help young people, especially girls, return to school and complete their education by running remedial courses designed to assist them upon their return and help them meet learning requirements. Additionally, we informed residents about the authorities' responsibility to ensure access to quality education, helping them to put pressure on public authorities, demanding access to quality education for all.

"I am very confident that when I complete my training, I will be a role model for change and inspire not just my peers, but the entire community."

SIERRA LEONE ZAMBIA BRAZII. In Brazil, 800 children from the Xakriaba tribe, experiencing marginalisation and exclusion, participated in educational activities. In Sierra Leone, 844 children who participate in the Child Sponsorship Programme were given bags, books, and stationery, while 300 students now benefit from a new school with three new classrooms and equipment. In addition, 50 girls joined a school reintegration support programme, and 180 girls who returned to school are supported and empowered through trainings and mentoring to continue school and serve as role models and inspiration for other children.

Indicatively in 2023

In Zambia, over **500 girls and boys** participated in Environmental School Clubs aimed at raising awareness about the climate crisis.

In Cambodia. 12 schools gained access to clean drinking water.

In Nepal, we established 40 teams with 840 children, informing them about their rights and teaching them how to claim them.

In Kenya, more than 5,500 students across 11 schools were trained on their rights and how to advocate for the services they deserve from the state.

In Rwanda, 18 student groups were trained on sexual reproductive health rights, and we created **8 new safe** rooms for girls.

SUPPORTING WOMEN

Promoting equality and eliminating gender-based violence

One of our core missions is to eliminate violence against women and support them in becoming independent and empowered to assert their rights.

In 2023 we implemented:

- educational programmes for women
- work inclusion programmes
- rights awareness events
- skill development actions
- public awareness events

Within this framework, through the **Momentum** European project, co-funded by the Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (AMIF 2021-2027), we aimed to improve access to vocational training opportunities and to the job market for young third-country national (TCN) women. This project focused on fostering cross-sector collaboration between civil society organisations, public bodies, employers and educational institutions. The Momentum project was implemented in 5 countries with the participation of **153 women** and more than 90 representatives from various institutions. In Greece, **30 women** took part in further training activities.

By participating in the project, women learned about their rights, service access procedures, and social entrepreneurship, while also building valuable social networks.

The empowerment boosted their confidence and improved their employability profile, helping them better integrate socially and economically into their host countries.



The **safe@work** project, supported by the Active Citizens Fund and jointly run in Greece by the Bodossaki Foundation and Solidarity Now, focused on combating sexual harassment in the workplace, through legal counselling, awareness campaigns, and educational activities for law students, HR executives and private sector employees across several cities in the country. At the same time, we organised events to raise awareness and inform institutions and organisations involved in protecting women's rights about the existing legislative framework and the ways in which we can protect women who experience sexual harassment in the workplace. The events were addressed to institutions and organisations from all over Greece, and they also helped open communication and cooperation channels among relevant bodies.

In total, around **850 people**, including HR staff, students, private sector employees, and the general public from Athens, Thessaloniki, Drama and Kavala, received training and information. Additionally, **118 people** were supported with legal counselling services throughout the project.



The Internisa European project, co-funded by the ENI CBC Mediterranean Sea Basin Programme, aimed to create synergies in order to enhance the employability of women by improving their digital skills, supporting the digital transformation of small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and carrying out interventions with institutional bodies. In 2023, **57 people** participated in the project's activities.

WOMEN

Women and girls at the heart of our action

In 2023, we continued our focus on supporting girls and women in numerous countries, knowing well about the daily injustices and discrimination they face. Women lack equal opportunities in education, property ownership, decision-making processes, employment, wages, and access to leadership roles.

To address this, we:

- informed women of their rights
- provided psychosocial support and legal aid
- created safe spaces
- kept girls away from child labour
- help girls return to school
- stopped child marriages
- fought against outdated customs, like dowry
- encouraged women and girls to express their opinions and become more active in civic matters, advocating for issues that concern them

For example, last year:

In Senegal, **100,000 women and girls** learned about their rights through ActionAid trainings.

In Ghana, we created COMBAT teams and trained **581 members** of such teams on genderbased violence, child protection and women's rights to property and paid care work.

> In Rwanda, we informed **600 women** about their reproductive health rights, provided psychological support to 60 survivors of gender-based violence and created eight new safe rooms for girls in schools.

In Tanzania, **170 women and 46 facilitators** met with village chiefs in the Mafia community, as well as with religious leaders, to address cultural barriers hindering women and girls' participation in decision-making processes. 65 girls, offering necessary STORIES OF CHANGE





"ActionAid has taught us many things, including women's right to participate in decision-making processes, express our opinions, and live free from violence. My husband has never been violent, but our relationship has improved significantly, because he now understands me better, and we work together as a couple. As a mother, I know how important it is to pass on what I've learned to my children, especially teaching my daughters about their rights and encouraging them to stand up for themselves. We want to make sure that when our daughters grow up, they will be able to receive inheritance and enjoy their right to their land."

"We, the women of the village, formed a group and ActionAid trained us. We meet once a month to discuss our concerns and explore potential solutions. One of our biggest challenges is the violence against women and girls. Through our discussions, we have realised that the culture of silence is a major reason why this violence continues in our part of the world. We all agreed it is important to report incidents of violence occurring within our families or in the community, and we have created a mechanism for doing so. While trying to find solutions, we also involved the men in the process, explaining to them why treating us this way is wrong."

Happy Home

In Bangladesh, we supported Happy Home, a shelter for girls in the Mohammadpur district of Dhaka. Happy Home provides shelter and education for girls who have lived on the streets and whose lives have been marked by sexual abuse, child marriages, poverty, and fear. In 2023, the shelter hosted 65 girls, offering them a safe environment and the resources necessary for future reintegration into the community.

YOUTH MOBILISATION

Fostering the active citizens of tomorrow

A very important part of our action is to mobilise citizens and especially young people in order to build a more inclusive society and promote a culture that protects the rights of all of us and lays the foundations for a sustainable and fairer future.

In Thessaloniki, **ActionAid's Youth Centre** is now a **Youth Hub**, providing numerous opportunities for training and action.

Thus, we offered training courses to a total of **302 people**, focusing on the development of skills, including leadership skills, and the implementation of initiatives and interventions in city life, mainly around the topics of climate justice, sustainable nutrition, tackling xenophobia and expression through art in the public space. At the same time, young people have been supported to participate in the Municipal Youth Councils in order to strengthen the participation of young people in democratic processes and to include young people from different social and cultural backgrounds in civic engagement.

@CTJUST

In this context, and following a series of trainings, mentoring, and meetings between young people from different countries, in 2023, the European project "@CTJUST: Youth @cting for climate justice: building a paradigm of online and offline engagement in the Covid-19 era" was completed. Ten young people from Thessaloniki joined forces with more than 60 young men and women from six other countries and travelled to the UN offices in Vienna to develop and present policy recommendations on climate justice. @CTJUST was supported by the Erasmus+ programme of the European Commission.




When it comes to mobilising young people through art, the Come2Art European project, allowed us to create opportunities for life skill development, and also enhanced the participants' contribution to city life, bringing together artists and young people with an interest in art through educational activities and creating art in the public space. Come2Art was co-funded by the Erasmus+ programme through the State Scholarships Foundation (IKY) acting as the National Coordination Unit for the implementation of the project in Greece.

WITH THE POWER **OF SOLIDARITY**

SOLIDARITY TRIPS

All our work in the field is implemented with the power of solidarity. The culmination of this act of solidarity is a field visit, where you can experience the power of change firsthand. You can listen to all these powerful stories of change from the heroes of everyday life themselves, see the impact of our work on the lives of entire communities, learn how we work and how your donation is put to good use in practice, meet the child you sponsor, experiencing something unique, which brings two worlds together as one.

Visiting the action areas can be done either by taking part in a group solidarity trip organised by ActionAid Hellas, or by taking an individual trip where the Sponsor meets the sponsored child. In addition, ActionAid staff visit the countries where we work to gather audio-visual material and deliver the news from the field firsthand.

In 2023 we organised **3** trips to our action areas:



In September, 44 people, Sponsors and staff, visited Kenya and more **KENYA** specifically, the Marafa community. In a very full week, we met the local people, we heard their stories, we visited projects that are being implemented thanks to the support of the Child Sponsors, we spoke to women's groups established by ActionAid and we drew some of their incredible energy and determination. At the same time, we learned about the challenges faced by the most vulnerable groups and the solutions that they aim for with the support of ActionAid, and we dug together, launching a safe space for women facing violence; we cooked together, we danced together, we were moved together - we experienced the power of "together" in practice! In addition, nine Sponsors met with their sponsored children, experiencing something unique.

BANGLADESH

In October, we visited Bangladesh along with the photographer Yiorgos Kaplanidis and documented the work in two communities I supported by ActionAid Hellas, namely Biswambarpur and Lalmonirhat. We spoke to representatives from women's groups, we met young people who are mobilised through

ActionAid's clubs and who change people's lives in the whole community, we saw firsthand the challenges local people are facing because of extreme poverty and the climate crisis, and at the same time we experienced their willingness to share what little they have. At the same time, we experienced firsthand the great change that is taking place through the contribution of Child Sponsors coupled with the tireless mobilisation of ActionAid staff, as well as the determination of the local people. We left, promising to continue to work for a fairer world, and we brought with us the hope that something great is indeed changing through solidarity both here and there.

CAMBODIA

In December, Olympia Mavrokosta visited the child she sponsors in Cambodia. There she was in for a wonderful surprise, as she met two children! The first sponsored girl had just turned 18 and had completed her participation in the Child Sponsorship Programme. Olympia visited her family and was delighted to hear in person that Shreymon had just moved to the city to study; the two of them chatted via video call. She then met six-yearold Keomly, who was also looking forward to starting her own path in the Child Sponsorship Programme This journey eventually turned into a double celebration that combined the completion of the programme for one child with the beginning for another, giving to the Sponsorship Programme a broader meaning than just connecting with a child: that of a life path based on solidarity, a stable relationship with people, an endless journey with many stops.

Everything we see in the field is achieved thanks to your contribution, too. You are our constant companion on the path to a fairer world and we hope that you will have the unique opportunity to see in person what we achieve together!

EMERGENCY APPEALS

Standing by the people in difficult times

In 2023 yet again, in a world of multiple and complex crises, millions of fellow human beings were confronted with humanitarian crises caused by conflict or natural phenomena. The more vulnerable the populations are, the heavier the consequences they suffer.

In these circumstances, once again solidarity came through the response of our supporters, i.e. your support, to restore hope to the people who were suffering and offer them relief from adverse conditions.

Thus, in 2023 2,253 people supported us, allowing us to contribute to the response of various crises around the world, such as the earthquake in Turkey and Syria, the food crisis in East Africa, the war in Ukraine, the earthquake in Nepal, the war in the Occupied Palestinian Territory.

In a world of crisis, having people who support our work alongside us, like you, is vital.

Gaza crisis: Gaza's schools have been turned into camps where children are forced to spend the day doing anything but schooling.





War in Ukraine: Displaced women and children arrive in the

village of Hrebenne, at the crossing point on the Polish side of the Ukraine-Poland border, where ActionAid works alongside its partners.

Earthquake in the Turkey-Syria border: ActionAid in collaboration with other partners in Syria provides psychosocial counselling and emotional support to children through mobile units. This includes puppet theatre and play, led by specialist teams.

Indicatively:

War in Ukraine: Humanitarian crisis conditions prevailed during the second year of the war, with 14.6 million people in need of humanitarian aid in order to rebuild their lives. By the end of 2023, we provided support and relief to more than 1.5 million people, by means of food distribution, protection and information, psychological support, household essentials. 30% of the people we supported belonged to minority vulnerable groups.

Gaza crisis:

GAZA

Since October 2023, a massive humanitarian crisis has been unfolding in Gaza, creating conditions of unspeakable tragedy. From the very first hours of the war, we managed to respond with the cooperation of our local office and local partners, despite the great difficulty in the delivery of humanitarian aid within the Gaza Strip. By the end of the year, 781 people supported our humanitarian action, including but not limited to: distribution of food and basic necessities, provision of shelter and clothing, medical assistance, psychological support.







Earthquake in Turkey and Syria:

The two major earthquakes in February, of 7.7 and 7.6 magnitude, caused untold havoc, with a direct impact on the lives of 9.1 million people in Turkey and 4.1 million in Syria. Our response on the ground was immediate and our donors' support touching. In total, 1,281 people contributed with donations so that we could provide immediate relief to the people suddenly caught up in the disaster. By the end of 2023, ActionAid on a global scale had supported a total of 157,870 people in Syria and Turkey.



ACTIONAID IN THE MEDIA

The new communications approach brought added value for ActionAid, with thousands of mentions in the press in Greece and Cyprus. More specifically, ActionAid mentions exceeded 2,000, while more than 100 original texts were sent to the media for publication.

ΜΕ ΑΦΟΡΜΗ την Παγκόσμια Ημέρα για την Εξάλειψη της Βίας κατά των Γυναικών στις 25 Νοεμβρίου, η Action<u>Aid</u> έδωσε στη δημοσιότητα νέα έρευνο για τις έμφυλες προκαταλήψεις που τροφοδοτούν τη βία κατά των γυναικών στην Ελλάδα. Σύμφωνα με τα ευρήματα της έρευνας, το 54% των ανδρών έχει τουλάχιστοι μία προκατάληψη, ενώ το αντίστορ ποσοστό για τις γυναίκες ανέρχεται στο 34%. Enionς, 1 στους 5 άνδρες έχει τουλάχιστον 3 προκαταλήψεις

Η έρευνα της ged ανέδειξε επίσης ότι το 44% έχει τουλάχιστον μία προκατάληψη για τη θέση των γυναικών. OUR DONORS

In 2023, ActionAid was supported in its multifaceted work in Greece and the world, by a multitude of donors, both Public Benefit Foundations and institutions, as well as by companies and private donors. We are grateful for the trust, the faith they have in our organisation and the opportunity they give us to join forces in the fight for a more sustainable and fairer world. Without their support, it would be impossible for us to make social impact that brings sustainable change to people's lives.

- The Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF), which over the years has supported ActionAid's major projects in Greece, gave a full grant for the Community Centre of Northern Evia as part of its Fire Relief Initiative for Northern Evia. The Community Centre was established by ActionAid in 2022, following the devastating fires of 2021, and has been operating ever since, by providing services and programmes to support the local population in the areas of education, skills development, integration into the labour market, rural entrepreneurship and psychosocial support, with New Agriculture New Generation, ARGO and SciCo as its partners.
- **Lidl Hellas** sponsored ActionAid's longest-running educational programme, the Student Action Week, which ran for the 19th year. The Student Action Week was called "The Power on Your Plate," and the programme was implemented by hundreds of schools and thousands of students across Greece. It is a strategic partnership designed for two academic years, with the aim of promoting sustainable nutrition, responsible consumption and good health, and inspiring actions around the themes of the following Sustainable Development Goals:
 - 3 / Good Health and Well-Being
 - 12 / Responsible Consumption and Production
 - 13 / Climate action



- H Alpha Bank has been by our side, consistently supporting the "Alphabet" of Economics," ActionAid's educational programme on financial literacy in schools in Greece, which has been running since 2019 and from 2021 onwards has joined the Bank's Corporate Social Responsibility Initiative titled IQonomy, strengthening its footprint in the Greek society.
- The European Investment Bank Institute supported the adaptation and transfer of ActionAid's "Alphabet of Economics" educational programme in Cyprus, enabling teachers and students in the last grades of primary school and in the first grades of secondary school in Cyprus to access financial literacy, linking it to active citizenship education.
- The John S. Latsis Public Benefit Foundation, ActionAid's constant partner for a fairer world, supporting Adult Placement Counselling and Career Management Counselling for young people aged 15-22 years old, i.e. two of the most important services of the ActionAid Centre in Athens.
- **DESFA**, has also been by our side, funding the Job Counselling Service at ActionAid's Centres in Athens and Thessaloniki. Together, the two donors gave new impetus to our efforts for job inclusion and career management of vulnerable groups and young people, in the two largest cities of our country.
- The TIMA Charitable Foundation supported the actions of ActionAid's Centre in Athens, which are aimed at adults aged 55+, and open a window into the world of activation, socialisation and inclusion.
- The UEFA Foundation for Children has enabled children who participate in the Sports for Inclusion pillar of our actions to experience a different style of football, which challenges stereotypes, promotes fair play, tolerance and cooperation. At the same time, children participating in ActionAid's programmes at our Centre in Kolonos, Athens, had the opportunity to live a unique experience, as they participated actively in the great celebration of the UEFA Super Cup held in August 2023 in Athens.
- The **Safe at Work** project for combatting sexual harassment at work continued to be implemented under the **Active Citizens Fund**. The Active Citizens Fund is supported through a €15 million grant from Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway as part of the EEA Grants 2014 – 2021. The programme aims to strengthen and enhance the sustainability of the civil society and to highlight its role in promoting and safeguarding democratic procedures, reinforcing active citizenship and defending human rights. The Fund Operator for the Active Citizens Fund in Greece is the Bodossaki Foundation in consortium with SolidarityNow.


- The European Commission and the State Scholarships Foundation, as the National Coordination Unit for the implementation of the Erasmus+ European Agenda for Education and Training, supported in 2023 the implementation of 14 European projects by ActionAid in Greece. Through the European funding programmes Erasmus+, Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (AMIF), Development Education and Awareness Raising Programme (DEAR), Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values Programme (CERV), ENI CBC Mediterranean Sea Basin Programme, and European Solidarity Corps - Volunteering in Humanitarian Aid Strand, various actions took place to empower people and communities through awareness-raising, education and activation. More specifically:
 - Educators and pupils alike were given the opportunity to be educated about climate justice and participation in democratic and civic life (European project YOULEAD), as well as the use of the arts to develop social and emotional skills (European project REIMAGINED).
 - Vulnerable groups were supported in their integration into the labour market and participation in civic life, including women and people with limited skills (European projects Momentum, Internisa, CitizensXelerator).
 - Young people were mobilised in sustainable nutrition issues (European project Food Wave), equal participation in municipal youth councils (European projects BE PART, Cities4Her, JuniorXpress), and participation in city life through actions of expression and creation of art in the public space (European project COME2ART) and sustainable regeneration of non-urban areas (European project PLACEOUT).
 - Young people from Europe participated in a programme of international volunteering through solidarity actions in Colombia, promoting gender equality and gender mainstreaming in everyday life (European Project YOUTH4HA).
- Under our Sports for Inclusion action pillar, through the different kind of football we teach, children and adolescents acquired skills for using and understanding the media by focusing on preventing youth radicalisation and challenging stereotypes (European project DIALECT2). We also adapted our football methodology in order for it to be integrated into physical education, and we trained physical education teachers and students (European project DIALECT3).
- Educational and counselling tools were created to tackle gender-based violence online, and to guide and raise awareness among parents, teachers, professionals and especially survivors of online violence or potential victims (European project TRACeD).

- **Vodafone CU**, through Future Wanted, has launched its support for the actions of ActionAid's Youth Hub addressed to young people aged 18-30, who take their first professional steps and want to enrich their skills, engage in activities they find interesting and get a job.
- Overall. ActionAid's Centre in Athens. ActionAid's Youth Centre in Thessaloniki and the Education Department, as well as our actions around the globe were supported by the A.G. As far as income is concerned, the main source was again private donations:



A. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Shareholders of the Non-Profit Organization «ActionAid Hellas»

(Translated from the original in Greek)

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Non-Profit Organization «ActionAid Hellas» ("the Organization"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2023, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Non-Profit Organization «ActionAid Hellas» (the Organization) as at December 31, 2023, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the regulations of L. 4308/2014.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs), as these have been incorporated in the Greek legislation. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Organization within the meaning of the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) that has been transposed into

Greek Law, and the ethical requirements, that are relevant to the audit of the financial statements in Greece and have fulfilled our other responsibilities under those ethical requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the regulations of L. 4308/2014 and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Board of Directors is responsible for assessing the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless Board of Directors either intends to liquidate Organization or to cease operations or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the Audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements, as a whole, are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.



TRANSPARENCY

Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control.

Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by Management.

Conclude on the appropriateness of Management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures an inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Organization to cease to continue as a going concern.

Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with Management regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
